## **Pymble Station Upgrade**

The Pymble Station Upgrade is part of the Transport Access Program, a NSW Government initiative to provide a station that is accessible to people with a disability, limited mobility, parents/carers with prams, and customers with luggage.

We thank you for your patience during this important work.

#### January work

On our last notification, we notified you of our work resuming on Monday 10 January 2022. To allow for our work to be completed with less disruption to commuters, our team will now resume on Tuesday 4 January 2022.

During the month of January, the team will continue working on the new lifts and upgrading the toilets on the station platform.

#### **Night work**

Between 7pm and 5am Monday 24 January, Tuesday 25 January and Thursday 27 January, we will be carrying out the following activities:

- vegetation clearing
- excavation and installation of new footings
- installation of electrical padmount
- installation of cable routes
- precast installation and steel for the new lift on the station platform

We will notify residents and businesses closer to the date.

### Plant and equipment

Equipment used throughout January includes excavators, vacuum truck, road saw, tipper truck, flatbed truck, tilt tray, concrete truck and pumps, crane, elevated working platforms, dump truck, various hand and power tools.

#### Tree removal

Last month, we removed the Wallangara White Gum located within the Pacific Highway carpark due to the tree contracting *Phellinus sp*, a fungal disease.

Following the tree removal, Wildlife Sydney accepted parts of the tree as donations to be used in various areas in their centres.

We also reached out to local elder Uncle Laurie, a local traditional owner from Guringai Tours, who repurposed the branches to make coolamons, an aboriginal carrying vessel.
