Mass Dimension and Loading Enforcement for Local Councils

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Local councils in NSW can nominate its enforcement officers to become authorised under the Road Transport Act 2013 to carry out compliance functions relating to the mass, length, loading and dimension of heavy and light vehicles. Carrying out these functions can help to protect roads as council assets.

This Authorisation enables council officers to conduct basic enforcement activity under the Road Rules NSW and other local Regulations, and provides officers with the necessary powers to enforce those rules. The Authorisation is useful for councils who are not partnered with the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator to perform the full range of mass and dimension compliance activity under the Heavy Vehicle National Law.

This Authorisation also enables limited enforcement of mass, loading and dimension requirements of light vehicles, such as small goods vans and utilities.

Background

Prior to August 2022, Transport for NSW (TfNSW) was responsible for carrying out the administration of the Heavy Vehicle National Law in NSW (HVNL). That function has now been transferred to the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator (NHVR). Previously, all councils wishing to engage in enforcement of mass and length requirements received appointments from the NHVR under the HVNL, and this facilitated the dual purposing of that appointment with the ability to also conduct basic road rule heavy vehicle compliance.

As the functions have now been split between TfNSW and NHVR, councils must now elect to either be a full HVNL enforcing council (known as a WOLG council), or a basic NSW road rule enforcing council.

The former will continue to be authorised under the HVNL by the NHVR, and in receiving those authorisations, officers will automatically also be able to conduct all NSW road rule compliance. The latter may choose not to engage in full HVNL compliance duties, and receive only the NSW road rule compliance authorisations from Transport for NSW.

Under the basic NSW road rule enforcement authorisation, council's authorised officers will have the powers to issue official cautions and penalty notices for breaches of the following rules and regulations:

Load Limit Signs (Road Rule 103)

No Trucks signs (whether displaying a mass limit or length limit - Road Rule 104)

No Buses signs (Road Rule 106)

Light vehicles in breach of mass, dimension or load restraint requirements (Road Transport (General) Regulation 2021 – Regulation 52)

Bridge Load Limit and Road Load Limit signage in a form other than Road Rule 103 (Road Transport (General) Regulation 2021 – Regulation 163)

Who can be nominated for authorisation?

Transport for NSW requires that:

- Officers are currently employed in an enforcement officer role by a local council and have been determined by council to be fit and proper for this employment
- Officers have the relevant experience in enforcement, in particular issuing penalty notices and official cautions
- Officers have formal training in investigation and legal proceedings, such as a Certificate IV in LocalGovernment (Regulatory Services) or a Certificate IV in Government Investigations or relevant diplomas.

How are officers nominated?

When one or more eligible officers have been identified, the General Manager of the council must:

- i. Write a letter recommending each nominated officer, outlining their:
 - a. experience and training, including formal certification

- b. suitability of character and outcome of Criminal History Check
- c. awareness of privacy and access information legislation
- d. understanding of their responsibilities and obligations to the community
- ii. Provide a Staff Information Request with the officer's personal information and signature
- iii. Provide an electronic passport size photo.

How many officers can a council nominate?

There is no limit on how many enforcement officers are authorised under the Road Transport Act 2013 as long as they meet the eligibility criteria.

Is additional training required?

Transport for NSW has developed an online training and assessment package to support the authorisation process. Council employees that are eligible for authorisation will be contacted by email by Transport for NSW and provided with a link to access the online learning package. They will be provided with a user name and password to log on. The package consists of a module which should take approximately 45 minutes to complete.

An identification card will be issued once the nominee has successfully completed the online training and the authorisation has been approved and issued.

What powers will enforcement officers be authorised?

In order to be able to enforce the local road rules listed above, council officers will also be given powers under their authorisation. Use of these powers will require the officer to show their identification card either at the time of exercise of the powers, or as soon as practicable afterwards.

Authorised officers will have the powers to:

- Stop a vehicle
- Direct a vehicle not to be moved, or a load or equipment altered
- Require a driver to produce their driver licence for inspection

- Require a driver to state their name and address
- Require a responsible person for a vehicle to nominate the driver of the vehicle or provide as much information as possible to allow the driver to be identified
- Issue official cautions and penalty notices.

Authorised officers exercising the above powers will be categorised as *Class 11* officers under the Road Transport (General) Regulation 2021 – Schedule 4.

(Note: when carrying out native council enforcement under the Road Rules, such as parking, officers are categorised as Class 10 officers)

In what circumstances can officers exercise their power?

Each Authorised Officer may exercise a power only in the following circumstances:

- a. As long as the Authorised Officer remains a council enforcement officer subject to the direction and control of the council, constituted under the Local Government Act 1993, which appointed the person as an enforcement officer
- b. Within the area of the council which appointed the person as an enforcement officer
- c. In connection with the enforcement of the listed rules and regulations
- d. For the purposes of roadside compliance
- e. In respect of a driver or operator.

How would the community know about this?

It is important that councils communicate to operators and the community that road side enforcement of signage such as truck mass limits on local roads, bridge mass limit signage, and load restrain on light vehicles and trailers may be enforced by council officers. This can be done through your Council's website and newsletters.
