The Newell Highway Program Alliance (NHPA) has delivered 38 additional overtaking lanes and various safety upgrades along the Newell Highway between Tocumwal and Narrabri over four years from 2019 to 2023.

The \$236.8 million program was jointly funded by the Australian Government and the NSW Government. The completion of the project means faster, safer and more reliable journeys for residents, tourists and freight operators travelling in regional NSW.



Improving highway resilience

To increase the resilience and reliability of the highway, and reduce ongoing maintenance costs the NHPA used new materials and techniques in construction.

Heavy bound pavements

Throughout the Program, the NHPA encountered varying ground and weather conditions whilst delivering 38 lanes across 26 project sites.

This variability in conditions provided an excellent opportunity to trial and test different methods and types of road pavement construction over the course of the last four years.

The Gullifers Road team designed, produced, and placed a Heavy Bound Base (HBB) pavement.

This type of pavement was selected to overcome the unique local challenges associated with the soil conditions in the Forbes region and to improve the overall flood resilience.

The type of soils located in the area below the road expand and contract significantly when exposed to moisture and are often inundated during flood events. In response the NHPA select the HBB which is a mix of cement with the conventional gravel pavement.

The product was sourced and produced from the Regional Quarries in Forbes. The HBB was adopted to improve future road resilience and prevent further road damage in flood events, ultimately leading to lower road maintenance costs while improving road safety and enabling more efficient journeys for road users.

Pavements to the full width of the highway

A number of the new overtaking lanes on the Newell Highway including those constructed at Daroobalgie, Gullifers Road, Pilliga and Bundidgerry include an overlay of the existing pavement and constructed across the full width of the highway. This approach was used to improve the overall asset and increase the pavement performance by adding a new pavement layer, further this approach improves durability and resilience of the road to flooding and ultimately reduce maintenance costs.

Environment

Tree planting on the Newell

During the design and development of all overtaking lanes a key consideration was to minimise removal of trees. However, in some cases and for safety reasons this was not always possible. The impact to vegetation was considered in the environmental assessment carried out for all NHPA works. Where trees with a diameter greater than 300mm required removal, the NHPA aimed to regenerate the area by planting seedlings.

The NHPA committed to planting around 10,000 native tree seedlings along areas that would experience construction impacts from tree removal.

This initiative has contributed to environmental restoration and played an important role providing positive engagement with landowners across NSW.

Program completion

The final overtaking lane to be delivered by the NHPA was the Bundidgerry overtaking lane.

The northbound overtaking lane at Narrandera was opened to traffic in November 2023.

In the past six months the NHPA also completed:

- the southbound overtaking lanes at Mirrool and Daroobalgie
- six new northbound and southbound overtaking lanes in the Pilliga, near the Pilliga Rest Area; at Sir William Bridges, about 24 kilometres south of Narrabri; and Dandry about 30 kilometres north of Coonabarabran.
- northbound and southbound overtaking lanes at Gullifers Road, about 15 kilometres south of Forbes.

Benefits of the NHPA



More efficient travel

More overtaking lanes on the Newell Highway provides more efficient journey times.



Increasing overtaking opportunities

More overtaking lanes reduces driver frustration and enables safer overtaking opportunities.



Improving freight efficiency

The overtaking lanes provide a more secure transport route for the freight and agricultural industry.



Connecting communities

The overtaking lanes provide better and safer connections between communities on the highway.



Improving road safety

The overtaking lanes increase overtaking opportunities for the mix of vehicles on the highway.



Rumble strips

Installation of rumble strips is estimated to reduce the likelihood of vehicles departing their lane by 15% to 25%.



Wide centreline

Centreline widening is estimated to reduce head-on crashes by 50% and run-off-road crashes by up to 25%.
