The Australian and NSW Governments are investing \$261.17 million in the Newell Highway heavy duty pavement upgrades between Narrabri and Moree to improve safety and travel reliability for all motorists.

Project reaches major milestone

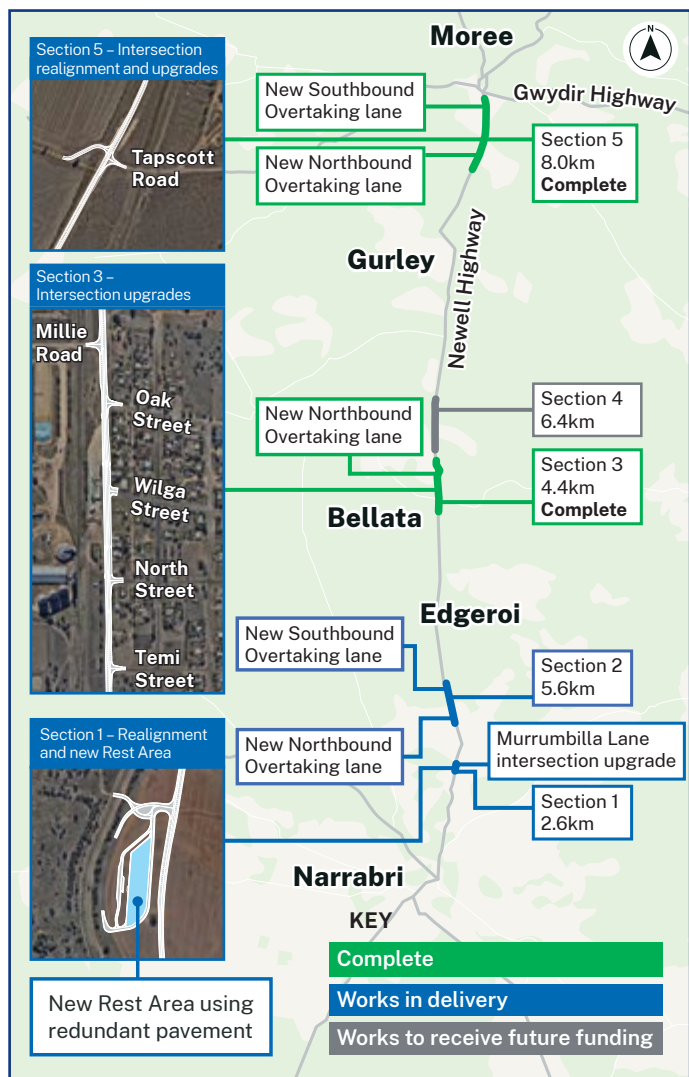
The project has reached a major milestone with two of the four priority sections now complete and open to traffic at Bellata and south of Moree. This includes three new overtaking lanes (two northbound and one southbound). In Bellata, the installation of pedestrian refuge islands will be completed later in the year.

Transport for NSW (Transport) acknowledges the impact the construction has had on communities, particularly the Bellata township, and we appreciate their patience while these important works have been carried out.

As the crews embark on the final leg of the journey, it is exciting to see the project now really starting to take shape.

Next steps

Work is progressing on the remaining two sections south of Edgeroi and north of Narrabri.

In Section 2, near Edgeroi, traffic has now switched over to a new section of the Highway, south of the township. This section is expected to be completed and open to traffic in coming weeks, weather permitting, and includes two new overtaking lanes and various intersection upgrades.

In Section 1, works are also progressing on the new formal rest area which is located 12 kilometres north of Narrabri and vegetation planting will be carried out following construction.

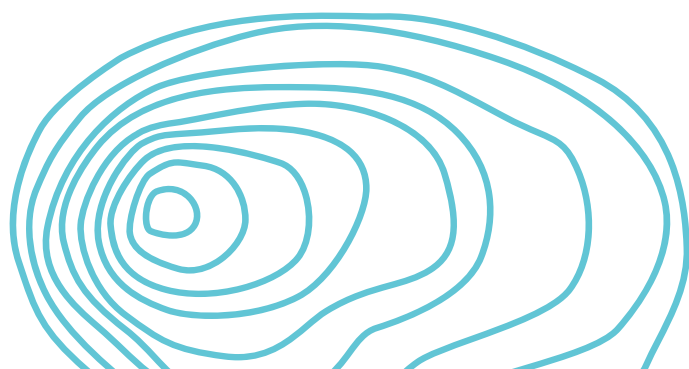
Planting will include hundreds of native trees in the vicinity of the rest area and old Highway, which will contribute to providing shade for motorists during rest stops.

The construction of a new culvert at Murrumbilla Lane north of Narrabri is also taking shape which will significantly improve drainage at this intersection in the future.

The project is on track to be completed in early 2026.

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Working with local landowners during harvest

Harvest season in the north-west has seen a significant increase in produce and Transport acknowledges the additional challenges that construction can have on farming communities. During the season we have worked closely with landowners along the construction corridor to minimise impacts where possible. Variable Message Signs (VMS) were also installed across the state including in the north-west to remind people to drive safely and be aware of wide vehicles.

With the cotton season now also well underway, motorists are reminded to be aware that there are still larger vehicles around and to share the road and follow the directions of signage and traffic control.

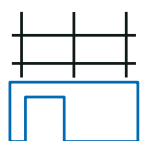

Improving sustainability

As part of the project's commitment to sustainability, the team has forged a close relationship with Challenge Industries in Narrabri, donating funds generated from recycling initiatives and visiting the site to meet staff.

At the completion of the two sections south of Moree and at Bellata, the project donated office equipment, including IT devices and furniture, as well as the yellow bins from both sites to Challenge Industries so they can store chicken feed for their chick breeding business, providing chicks to local residents and farmers.

The business employs more than 40 local people with disabilities to manage recycling of materials at their Narrabri processing plant.

Thanks to some community advocates in the Bellata township, Transport became aware of palm trees at Sugar's Park that had been planted by the late Richmond Raymond "Sugar" Roberts. 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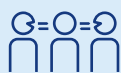


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
