Each quarter we'll provide an update on JSIP activities on the Regional Rail Project.



#### Maintenance centre naming event - Mindyarra

The Regional Rail Project is excited to announce that the new Dubbo Maintenance Facility has been named the *Mindyarra Maintenance Centre*. This is the first time an Aboriginal word has been used to name a maintenance facility on the Transport for NSW network.

Mindyarra (pronounced Min-dga-rra) is a Wiradjuri word that means to fix or repair. It was chosen through collaboration with the Project's Aboriginal Working Group and representatives from local Aboriginal organisations.

The Regional Rail Project's Director, Guy Collishaw says, "Achieving this outcome through collaboration with local representatives from different organisations is a significant achievement. We have demonstrated Transport's commitment to reconciliation while acknowledging the Traditional Owners and Custodians of the land the facility is being built on. We are hoping people will see the literal meaning of Mindyarra, while understanding the symbolic meaning of repairing relationships."



To celebrate the naming of the facility an event was held on site with the Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Paul Toole MP, the Local Member for Dubbo Dugald Saunders MP, members of the Transport for NSW executive and the Project's Aboriginal Working Group. Senior representatives from Momentum Trains and their partners were also on site to celebrate.

The event also marked the start of major construction, with the first concrete foundations for the facility being poured during NAIDOC week. Minister Toole and the Local Member picked up shovels to help with the pouring of one of the foundations.

The Formwork, Reo, concrete pour contract, valued at approximately \$3.6 million, was awarded to a local Dubbo business, LMJR. This is another local business benefiting from the centre being built in Dubbo, one of the key objectives of the Regional Rail Project.

#### Regional Rail Project Aboriginal Working Group

Transport for NSW adopts a collaborative approach on the Regional Rail Project. The Aboriginal Working Group (AWG) was established in 2018, and includes representatives from Federal, State and Local government. The group provides advice and support to Transport for NSW and Momentum Trains to help deliver JSIP priorities and objectives.

Aboriginal Working Group members have links to the local Aboriginal community in and around Dubbo, and focus on achieving meaningful outcomes for Aboriginal peoples.

Belinda Pritchell became a member of the AWG in late 2019 and brings her experience as a Training Services NSW Senior Project Officer Skills Broker with NSW Department of Education. Belinda provides assistance to help retrain or upskill local staff, or to help local businesses find staff with specific experience to fill their vacant positions. Her passions include education, employment, training and economic prosperity for the Communities, families and individuals.

Belinda's connections are from the Dhungutti, Biripi and Worimi nations on the mid north coast and great lakes region of NSW. Belinda was born in Wollongong and raised on Awabakal country in Newcastle.

Belinda has lived and worked in Dubbo for 20 years and has worked in both the non-government and government sectors in the areas of employment, training, youth and mental health. Belinda says, "As a proud Aboriginal woman living and working off country I am grateful to be given the opportunity to work and provide input into the AWG that focuses on local Aboriginal people across the Dubbo community gaining transferable skills which lead to sustainable employment today and into the future."

#### Dubbo region businesses building the Regional Rail Project

#### Diran Ngurumbang Consulting

Diran Ngurumbang Consulting is a RAB based in Narromine and owned by local Aboriginal man, Paul Brydon (locals know him as 'Midnight'). Paul started the business in 2005 and provides specialist environmental and heritage services.

Following advice from Regional Rail Project staff, Paul worked towards his business becoming registered with Supply Nation. With support from the JSIP Hub team and Summit Employment and Training's Aboriginal Economic Development Officer, Tatum Moore, Paul was able to register his business.

In 2020, Diran Ngurumbang Consulting was awarded the contract for weed spraying on the Project site and continues to provide this service for the Project when needed.

#### Concrete World Industries

Concrete World Industries Dubbo branch has been awarded the reinforcement supply portion of the Formwork, Reo, Concrete pour package on the Project, worth approximately \$1 million. Concrete World Industries, with branches in both Dubbo and Orange, supplies The Central West of NSW with reinforcement mesh, accessories, chemicals, formwork, tools and machinery for the concreting and construction industry. They truly are a "one stop shop" for the concrete industry.

Concrete World's competitive advantage is being able to produce small amounts to top up short orders with a quick turnaround, this is possible due to having specialised staff who understand the customer's requirements and deadlines. The reinforcing products Concrete World Industries use are produced in Australia under the Australasian Environmental Product Declaration (EDP) programme in accordance with ISO 14025 and EN 15804. Concrete World Industries attended Transport for NSW's tender writing workshop in September 2019 and this led to the business tending for work on the project. They were the successful contractor awarded this package in October 2020.

Founded in Dubbo in 2002, MAAS Civil Pty Ltd (MAAS) completes a diverse range of civil and infrastructure works within civil, infrastructure and mining end markets across Australia. Today MAAS has a fleet in excess of 300 and a diverse and experienced team of over 600 staff. The MAAS workforce for the Regional Rail Project was local to the Dubbo region, with the engagement of local suppliers and subcontractors also generating indirect employment through the supply chain and local community.

Representatives from MAAS attended the Transport for NSW tender writing workshop in September 2019, remarking that 'the workshop provided a very informative, step by step process on how to prepare for a tender before submitting'.

MAAS delivered direct employment for approximately 80 people through the delivery of a bulk earthworks package on the Project, valued at approximately \$4 million. To ensure their commitments to the Project were met, MAAS employed a number of new employees and worked with local subcontractors and suppliers.

MAAS are proud to have the following members of the local Aboriginal community on our team.

Maddi Chapman was employed specifically for the Project and worked in the site ticket office and proved valuable to the MAAS team. She continues to work from MAAS HQ in the logistics team.

Ryan Williams was employed specifically for the Project as a front end loader operator and continues to work for MAAS as an operator in the quarry.

Brad Bates, an existing MAAS employee, began on the Project as a grader operator. During his work on the Project he demonstrated leadership potential, so he was promoted to site supervisor and continues to work on other major projects.

With a long history of supporting local communities, the Project provided the MAAS team with the opportunity to demonstrate their commitment to Regional NSW.



#### Pre-Employment Program (PEP) – participants celebrate their achievements

The Pre-Employment Program is part of the NSW Government's commitment to developing the skills of regional people, and supports the Regional Rail Project's JSIP objectives.

Eight regional job seekers participated in the Pre-Employment Program run by Transport for NSW, Momentum Trains and their Consortium Partners. The 2020 Program ran for four weeks in November and December 2020.

The Program course covered three components:

- 1. Accredited training for white card, civil construction, traffic control, and first aid.
- 2. Non-accredited component resume and cover letter writing, and mock interviews to prepare for future job interviews.
- 3. Work experience on site with LMJR Building Group from Dubbo.
